Giant crane for water project

A 250 tonne crane will be used to install a large pipe bridge which is being fabricated as part of the Northumbrian Water and Tees Valley Pipeline Project.

The project is to provide a resilient supply of clean and clear water to customers for decades to come.

Fabrication of the 25m long x 4.5m wide pipe bridge began last month. The structure is being fabricated in two sections due to its length to allow for transport and will be assembled on site at Alwent Beck on the River Tees. Northumbrian Water is improving the underground network of water pipes in a £100m project.

In total, 34km of new pipe will be installed. This project will have an integral role in providing resilience in the water supply in England.

It is the second notable project that AJ Engineering has done with Northumbrian Water being the end client, continuing our work in the UK wide water sector.

The 1st Forres Scout Group visited the AJE HQ ahead of a trip to Orkney to see how a project at Lyness involved the Forres firm.

The group will be visiting the Scapa Flow Museum as part of their summer trip.

Back in 2020, AJ Engineering and its Fort William-based sister company NEWCo, secured a contract to work on the historic visitor centre.

The project involved the restoration of the historic buildings, the enhancement of interpretation and displays, and the creation of a building to house an exhibition space, café, toilet facilities and information areas. The NEWCo team also repaired one of the significant chimneys and made a replica of a second one which could not be restored.

Graham Alexander, said: "It was pleasure to show the scouts around the AJE HQ and to give them an insight into the Scapa Flow Museum project. It will be great for them to have a local connection to the centre when they visit. It was also great to give them a general insight into what we do here at AJ Engineering and who knows maybe we have inspired some future engineers."
